St Peter's Cathedral, Armidale, NSW

The Cathedral, designed by the noted architect John Horbury Hunt, was completed in 1875. Hunt also provided options for a bell tower, but these were not pursued at the time due to cost. The tower was completed in 1939, due largely to a donation of the 150,000 bricks by GF Nott, a local builder and philanthropist. The supervising architect was FG Castleden of Newcastle, and the design followed Hunt's intentions, including the creative use of brickwork. The 8 bells were cast by the Whitechapel foundry in early 1996 and installed later that year in a locally built steel frame designed by Eayre & Smith. The costs of the bells, the frame and internal alterations to the tower, were met by public donation and labour "in kind".

The weekend of 3rd to 5th November 2023 was set aside for the 27th anniversary weekend ringing at Armidale; a week later than usual to allow all our learners to benefit from the presence of visiting and returning ringers. The primary aim of the weekend was to develop the capability of the Armidale band, plus giving some of our visitors their first chance to ring for some months or years. We were pleased to welcome eight visitors from Sydney (4), Newcastle, Coffs Harbour and the Gold Coast (2).

Our thanks go to Enid Roberts, Kathi Downs and Geoff Milne for running the ringing sessions, and to all the visitors for helping our learners further up 'the learning curve', and for reenergising Armidale ringing yet again!

One of our new ringers, Kathy Creamer, is a published illustrator of her own and others' books. Kathy agreed to render one of our group photos from the weekend into a cartoon - you can see it in *eRT*. The front cover illustration is based on the recruitment poster also produced by Kathy - we've already acquired four new learners who saw it.

From the President

As 2023 concludes, it is nice to reflect on our accomplishments over the past 12 months. The delegation of control (and an associated budget) for specific initiatives has continued to prove valuable, such as the recent Surprise Major weekend in Brisbane and the earlier teaching programme in



Darwin, with similar initiatives already organised well into 2024 including, in January, ART in Adelaide and a Surprise Major weekend in Perth. Part of the backing for such events can be attributed to a generous bequest from Jenny Murphy - read the full story on page 11. Careful management of this significant resource, alongside our huge geographical area [and I am writing this from the middle of the Nullabor Plain...] sets us apart from most ringing societies. On the subject of distance, the two newest towers within ANZAB had their inaugural ringing in December – at Palmerston, NT, and Wahroonga, NSW; a mere 4000km apart! Well done to those involved and I'm sure reports on both projects will follow shortly. On this page in *eRT* you're listening to the newly installed Wahroonga bells, ringing for the first time on Christmas Day.

Partly due to these differences from other territorial associations, a significant review of the constitution has occurred in recent months to identify areas for positive change, most of which stem from definitions of associate members and clauses which relate to them. The original 1960s document, with largely similar rules to English territorial associations founded in the 1800s, can read awkwardly through today's lens. The ease of long-distance travel, Zoom, and more nomadic lifestyles (inter/intrastate and overseas) are extremely relevant to an association such as ANZAB today, but science fiction to the original authors. I encourage you to review the changes, see page 14, and confirm that there should be no practical difference to any active member (but a great help to the volunteers on the board!) Commenting on the board, there will be multiple vacancies on the ANZAB board this year (and my time as president will be up!). Some of you have already been approached to consider standing for a position, but I encourage all members who may be interested to make contact. It can be very rewarding, and it's an exciting (but hopefully quite a stable!) time within ANZAB. Thomas Perrins

From the Advisory Panel Co-ordinator Q. Hello, We'd like to know what type(s) timber

Q. Hello, We'd like to know what type(s) timber other towers use for their stays. We have been using spotted gum but are finding that this wood is too soft and easily broken. A Tower Captain



A. Dear Tower Captain, Some years ago one of our ringers here in Perth, who is an engineer, did some research into a suitable native timber to

use as a substitute for air-seasoned ash, which is the traditional timber used for stays in the UK. He came up with Tasmanian oak as having the nearest physical characteristics to ash.

According to our researcher's discoveries, Tasmanian oak is the name used for three almost identical species of eucalypt hardwoods, eucalyptus delegatensis (alpine ash), eucalyptus regnans (mountain ash) and eucalyptus obliqua (messmate), all of which are normally marketed collectively. The timber has a long-grain structure similar to ash and as a result has, like its English equivalent, a very good tensile strength.

Not that we break many stays here, but Tasmanian oak has been in use as a stay material in Western Australia for at least 20 years and has proved itself to be a very good substitute for ash. Its one drawback is that not all timber merchants stock it, but we have found that the timber merchants who specialise in native timbers can easily supply it. Best Wishes,

IHOIBAIRT IRIINGHIRS? TOUIR No 2

Sometime in 2022 the idea of a ringing outing with our new ringers took hold. Coming up with the idea was easy. Finding a slot and making it happen was harder. It turns out that people have lives outside of ringing! Earlier this year, however, we realised there was a window of opportunity for six of us in September. Organisation started in earnest. The plan was to drive up the Hume Highway and ring at every tower along the way. Towers

Fine-tuning of the itinerary continued through July and August as the last of the confirmations from towers came through, driving times were doublechecked & adjustments made. Finally, the question everyone is asking: if this was ringing tour no. 2, when and what was no. 1? A clue is at the bottom of our t-shirt graphic. In late 1889, six ringers from Holy Trinity Church in Hobart travelled to Melbourne to attend the opening of the bells of St. Paul's Cathedral on 1 Jan 1890¹. Their trip was as successful as ours by all accounts. We know this because several detailed reports appeared in Hobart's Mercury newspaper, even including the Bishop of Melbourne's speech at a grand dinner held on the opening day. The ringers raised money for their trip by putting on a concert at the Hobart Town Hall, involving several choirs including the Orpheus Choir, of which the ringers

were founding members. They kept account of income and expenses as can be seen in their cash book (right), which we still have. There is already



talk of Ringing Tour No. 3, which, to continue the tradition of 133 years between tours, is scheduled for sometime in 2156.



SurveyMonkey and 12 Bell Event Feedback

ANZAB has invested in a subscription to Survey-Monkey, greatly faciliating event registrations on line; but also allowing easy feedback surveys after the event. Here's a summary of the Feedback survey completed by 27 of the attendees at the October 10 & 12 bell events and other ANZAB 12 Bell ringers:

The average rating given to the event by those who were in Goulburn and/or Sydney: 74% felt there was a good mix of straightforward and more complex 12 Bell ringing; although 29% would have liked more time

The 10 Bell "Towards 12 Bell Ringing" sessions (introduced the first time this year) were extremely popular with almost 80% of respondents wanting to see these sessions at future weekends.

for more complex 12 Bell methods and spliced Maximus.

One ringer felt there were too many quarter peals, another felt they didn't get a fair go; but overall 60% of respondents were very happy with the quarter peal attempts they were in.

Two thirds of attendees rang for at least one Sunday service.

80% said they thought ANZAB subsidies for "early-birds" are a good way to attract attendees and ensure event viability, with 50% wanting to see ANZAB subsidies expanded. 96% approved of the "Young Ringer" Scholarships (see page 14 for next year's). Over 80% voted to continue two 12 Bell Weekends a year, with one in Sydney and the other a "remote" location.

There were also many very helpful comments provided including:

- I'd like to be given more opportunity to conduct on 10/12 bells.
- Can we aim for closer gender parity in session ringing masters?
- Many up and coming ringers at CCSL. We rang back to back, and great to share ringing master duties. It would be good to do again.
- Unfortunately I'm too old for this intensive ringing. I can't cope with public transport so will never attend any again.
- The weekends maintain interest and enthusiasm, build skills and build networks (to different degrees for different attendees).
- Having two events on subsequent weekends was too much.
- More Surprise Maximus QPAs would be good to re-enforce methods for new S Maximus ringers

See more comments in *eRT*; contact me for the full feedback details. The vast majority of respondants reported that the events improved their 10/12 bell skills, with one reporting going from zero to 62% of the way to Spliced Surprise Maximus ringing!

Introducing Mentoring to the next ANZAB 10 & 12 Bell Weekend

Summary

It's difficult to teach ringing on 10 and 12 bells. It's a difficult skill to learn too. There aren't many resources to help, nor opportunities to practice. Mentoring is a common educational technique in the corporate world, and could be used to help us at our next 10 & 12-bell weekend. These are my thoughts about how this could help us in ANZAB. Let me know what you think.



What is Mentoring?

Boiled down, mentoring is two people meeting informally, in order for one of them to learn from the other. Wikipedia has a good overview: https://en.wikipedia.org/wiki/Mentorship

A quick Google search shows that mentoring is promoted throughout the corporate world, and in academia, by groups as diverse as surgeons and public servants, even the UN(!) There are also many books available that describe mentoring in detail. Important for us bellringers though, is that the mentee selects the mentor. The mentee gets one-on-one feedback, specific to the problems that they would like to address. This is in contrast with classroom sessions where both the teacher and agenda are fixed in advance, and the session is aimed at the group as a whole.

What might it look like for a 10 & 12-Bell Weekend? Anything really, but what about this three-step process:

Step One – What Am I Trying to Learn This Weekend? Examples could be:

- - Learning to Plain Hunt on 10 or 12. It could be something you want to ring for the first time.
 - Learn to ring 2 leads of Cambridge Royal. An example of a bite-size piece to learn.
 - Perfecting ringing Stedman Cinques. It could be that you have a goal you've been trying to achieve for a while, but never quite got there, something you've started, but not quite nailed. Learning to call that well-known but difficult touch of 3,000-Spliced Surprise Maximus, while ringing the 11 and 12 simultaneously.

You don't necessarily need a clearly-defined goal at this stage. But you do need to know roughly what you're trying to learn, as that could affect Step Two.

Step Two - Who Can I Learn From?

Your mentor obviously needs to have the experience you're looking for to learn from. Choose someone you like and respect, who you think could be able to help and explain whatever it is you want to learn in a way that you will understand and enjoy.

Most experienced bellringers will be flattered, and very willing to help if you ask them. It's very rewarding for them: many people in the corporate world say that coaching others in this way is one of the most satisfying parts of their jobs.

Who doesn't enjoy sharing their skills and experiences with someone else?

Step Three – Let's Get to It!

Mentoring is a very flexible process, and organising it depends entirely on what you and your mentor agree to. Examples for a 10 & 12 bell weekend could be:

- Meet your mentor at the beginning of the weekend to go over some theory, in order to get you started.
- Meet your mentor at the beginning of the weekend, and also at the end of the weekend, to get you started and to include a round-up of what you learned during and next steps.
- Meet your mentor at the beginning of the weekend. Go through some theory. Have your mentor stand behind you as you put into practice what you've been talking about. Another theory session, including feedback on the ringing. Another practice session and feedback. Wrap up by identifying what you've learned and discuss next steps.

Mentoring is unstructured, with no fixed rules; you and your mentor can agree when to do it again, or not. If it worked well and you learned something, book your next slot in! If it didn't, and you didn't, then don't. Easy-peasy!

Of course the Step Zero that I've omitted is the difficult one: before you do anything, you have to decide for yourself that there's something you want to learn, and that your desire to learn it is larger than that natural reticence that we all feel when we ask someone for help.

Next Steps for Mentoring in ANZAB

If you think this could be for you, and have someone in mind as a mentor, then go ahead and ask them! You could use this article to help explain to your mentor what you have in mind.

Perhaps we could approach a few possible mentors and advertise them as "available". That could help break the ice.

We might even persuade ANZAB to fund lunches for mentoring sessions. If there were a small amount of money (say \$30?) available toward the cost of a lunch together (what about 1 per weekend per mentor?) that could provide people with enough encouragement to get things started. (We would need the right people in ANZAB to agree to this, unless we just steal the money!)

Mentoring is certainly not a silver bullet for ringing in ANZAB, but my hunch is that it could help and be useful for some people. Please let me know if it interests you - I'm happy to take the idea further if anyone thinks it would help them. Possible mentors look out – I may be in touch! Angus Gilchrist





A DECADE OF LEGACY

The Background

A 2013 Quarter alerted many to some extraordinary generosity:

Then Ringing Towers Summer edition 2014 reported: *The Public Donations Fund has received a bequest from the estate of Jenny Murphy, a well-known and highly regarded ringer in Melbourne.* She was very generous in her passionate commitment to ringing



and instrumental in supporting, in particular, the band at St Bartholomew's, Burnley. She also donated two bells to St David's Cathedral, Hobart. She was ANZAB Secretary 1990-1995 and in 2002 was made an ANZAB Honorary Life Member.

A decade later seems an appropriate time to reflect on the legacy of Jenny's generosity, along with other non-preferenced donations.

The Value of the Bequest

Ringing Towers continued: The total bequest from Jenny is \$673,693. Up to \$150,000 has been allocated to replace the existing ring of bells at Jenny's adopted home tower of Burnley. Work is underway by Whitechapel to supply & install a new light ring of 6 bells, tenor 4cwt, as a memorial to Jenny Murphy. In eRT you're listening to the old Burnley bells, now in Wahroonga.

The Funds Committee & General Donations Fund

The very substantial bequest led to the establishment in of the ANZAB Funds Committee to develop and recommend policies and procedures for long-term effective governance of the Public Donations Fund (PDF), and to administer the fund to meet ANZAB's objectives for the development of ringing.

Since 2015 Jenny's bequest has been held in the General Donations Fund (GDF), which also receives non-tax deductible donations and other income. Prior to 2015 (and the creation of the GDF) ANZAB made non-preferenced/non-tax deductible grants from the PDF and the Working Fund. For completeness in covering the decade since Jenny's Bequest was known, the figures below include non-preferenced/non-tax deductible grants from the PDF and the Working Fund in 2013 and 2014.

Jenny's bequest allowed the bulk of these grants. A fantastic legacy! One we can feel sure Jenny, and other donors, would be proud of.

The Future

The Funds Charter adopted in 2015 included the following stipulation: Further expenditure should be limited to the income generated by funds ..., thus preserving the unpreferenced capital.

Over the period from 2015 (when this requirement was adopted) to 2022 income of \$192,454 had been received (interest, investment returns, franking credits and donations) with grants and expenses of \$94,423 leaving \$98,031 available to further ANZAB objectives. At the end of 2023 this figure has increased to \$101,173.

The opportunity exists to continue supplementing installation projects plus give grants for training, ringing development, recruitment etc - ANZAB welcomes proposals from members for funding of initiatives meeting the Association's objectives.

You can see a complete breakdown of all the figures in *eRT*. Note: During this period the capital in the GDF has been preserved (as required by the Charter). In 2015 at the establishment of the GDF capital was \$523,694. At the end of 2022 capital plus investment revaluation totalled \$555,532.



Margarete, often known as Margaret, was my fairy godmother, and wife of Bob of The Bob Ferris Striking Competition Shield. She was born in Kogarah NSW in 1934 and passed away in Bendigo in 2023. Margarete provided a lot of assistance to

Bob when he was President of ANZAB (1978-80). For this and other support of the ringing fraternity, she was made an Honorary Associate Member in 1983.

At one stage Margarete was parishioner, chorister and server at St Paul's, Burwood. Ross Bampton tried teaching her to ring there, but she didn't take to it. Some time later, after Bob's death, I taught her to ring and she became a regular ringer for evensong at St Philip's Church Hill, so she was in the unusual position of being a Ringing Member and an Honorary Associate Member of ANZAB. I had the privilege of conducting her 3 quarter peals.

I remember Margarete for the many cakes she made for ANZAB celebrations, and one that she carried to England for a daughter's wedding, and for her lacework which was exhibited at Government House, Parramatta.

Her funeral was on 6 Nov at St Paul's Cathedral, Bendigo.

because the Editor reported: "The Annual Competition Ring for the Association and the Duncan Shields will take place on Feb 5, but we can assure Sydney Truth Newspaper that, unlike prize ringing conducted many years ago in England, and which was justly frowned on by the English Guilds, there will be no "bets in the belfry" when local teams compete for the coveted trophies."

In March Bill Rowe conducted the fiftieth

peal for the Association.

"At the Quarterly meeting on 10th Sept T. Goodyer of St Mary's was elected a Full Member of the NSWACR", the predecessor of ANZAB. Tom is believed to be the first ringer to reach 75 years of continuous membership and was presented with a certificate in December 2023 to record this milestone. *In eRT see Tom (96 years old) with his certificate*

The previous issue recorded the first ANZAB Ladies Tower Bell Peal, with the comment "The ladies' peal evidently went off very well with Jenny Murphy deserving special mention ... at the end of the peal she was almost knee-deep in tufts of rope." AUSTRALIAN AND NEW ZEALAND ASSOCIATION OF BELLRINGERS PROPOSED CHANGES

10.2 An Honorary Life Member is a member of the company who has rendered substantial service to the Exercise in Australia or New Zealand appointed as an Honorary Life Member by an annual general meeting of the company provided that any such appointment shall have been recommended by a unanimous resolution of the directors.

11. Who can be a member

In addition to the **initial member**, membership of the **company** shall be open to any person who:

- (a) is a resident of Australia or New Zealand at the time of election, and
- (b) has rung unaided a plain course of any treble dominated minor method or the extent of any doubles method on an 'inside' tower bell or has rung an extent of any minor method two-in-hand or has been an active ringer for at least 12 months or in special circumstances has been declared eligible for membership by resolution of the directors, and
- (c) has paid the required subscription.

12. How to apply to become a member

- 12.1 A person may apply to become a **member** of the **company** by signing and sending to the Secretary or by submitting to the Secretary in electronic form approved by the directors an application for membership stating that they:
 - (a) want to become a **member**, and
 - (b) support the purposes of the **company**, and
 - (c) agree to comply with the company's constitution, including paying the guarantee under clause 4 if required.
- 12.2 The application must include:
 - (a) the certificate of a **member** that the person has the necessary qualifications referred to in clause 11, and
 - (b) the address nominated by the applicant for the service of notices.

CURRENT CONSTITUTION

10.2 An Honorary Life Member is a member of the company who has rendered substantial service to the Exercise in Australia or New Zealand appointed as an Honorary Life Member by an annual general meeting of the thecompany provided that any such appointment shall have been recommended by a unanimous resolution of the directors.

11. Who can be a member

In addition to the **initial member**, membership of the **company** shall be open to any person who:

- (a) is a resident of Australia or New Zealand, and
- (b) has rung unaided a plain course of any treble dominated minor method or the extent of any doubles method on an 'inside' tower bell or has rung an extent of any minor method two-in-hand or has been an active ringer for at least 12 months or in special circumstances has been declared eligible for membership by resolution of the directors, and
- (c) has paid the required subscription.

12. How to apply to become a member

- 12.1 A person may apply to become a **member** of the **company** by signing and sending to the Secretary or by submitting to the Secretary in electronic form approved by the directors an application for membership stating that they:
 - (a) want to become a member, and
 - (b) support the purposes of the **company**, and
 - (c) agree to comply with the **company**'s constitution, including paying the guarantee under clause 4 if required.
- 12.2 Subject to subclause 12.3 the application must include:
 - (a) the certificate of a **member** that the person has the necessary qualifications referred to in clause 11, and
 - (b) the address nominated by the applicant for the service of notices.
- 2.3 The certificate referred to in subclause 12.2 is not required of an applicant who is or who is qualified to be an **associate member** of the **company** by virtue of paragraphs 17(b) or 17(c).

15. When a person stops being a member

A person immediately stops being a **member** if they:

- (a) die, or
- (b) resign, by writing to the Secretary, or
- (c) are expelled under clause 26, or
- (d) within 6 months of it falling due for payment they fail to pay the annual subscription, if applicable.

17. Who can be an associate member

Associate membership of the **company** shall be open to any person who is not qualified for membership of the **company** and who has paid the required subscription.

18. How to apply to become an associate member

- 18.1 A person referred to in clause 17 can apply to become an associate member of the company by signing and sending to the Secretary or by submitting to the Secretary in electronic form approved by the directors an application for associate membership stating that they:
 - (a) want to become an associate member, and
 - (b) support the purposes of the **company**, and
 - (c) agree to comply with the **company**'s constitution.
- 18.2 The application must include:
 - (a) the signed nomination of the person or nomination in electronic form approved by the directors by a **member** of the **company**, and
 - (b) the address nominated by the applicant for the service of notices.

15. When a person stops being a member

A person immediately stops being a member if they:

- (a) die
- (b) resign, by writing to the Secretary
- (c) are expelled under clause 26
- (d) within 6 months of it falling due for payment they fail to pay the annual subscription, if applicable, or
- (e) cease to be a resident of Australia or New Zealand.

17. Who can be an associate member

Associate membership of the **company** shall be open to any person who:

- a) is a resident of Australia or New Zealand who is not qualified for membership of the **company** and who has paid the required subscription, or
- (b) is not and never has been a resident of Australia or New Zealand who has met the requirements of clause 11(b) and has paid the required joining fee, or
- (c) is not a resident of Australia or New Zealand but who was
 - a **member** of the **company** or
 - ii a member of the predecessor Association at the time when they ceased to be a resident of Australia or New Zealand.

18. How to apply to become an associate member

- 8.1 A person referred to in clause 17(a) or (b) must apply to become **associate member** of the **company** by signing and sending to the Secretary or by submitting to the Secretary in electronic form approved by the directors an application for associate membership stating that they:
 - (a) want to become an **associate member**, and
 - (b) support the purposes of the **company**, and
 - (c) agree to comply with the **company**'s constitution.
- 18.2 The application must include:
 - (a) the signed nomination of the person or nomination in electronic form approved by the directors by a **member** of the **company**, and
 - (b) the address nominated by the applicant for the service of notices.
- 18.3 A person referred to in clause 17(c) may by notice in writing to the Secretary become an **associate member** of the **company** without further payment of any subscription or joining fee.

23. Subscriptions: Determination and when payable

- 23.1 The subscriptions payable by **members** and subscriptions and joining fee payable by **associate members** shall be determined from time to time at an annual **general meeting**, and may incorporate such special rates, discounts, or differing arrangements for residents of Australia and New Zealand as may be determined at an annual **general meeting**.
- 23.2 No subscriptions shall be payable by **Honorary Life Members** or by **Honorary Associate Members**.
- 23.3 Subscriptions shall become due and payable on the first day of July each year or on such other date as may be determined at an annual **general meeting**.
- 23.4 The Secretary may determine a reduced fee for a new **member** or **associate member** joining during a subscription year
- 23.5 Peal fees shall be determined from time to time at an annual general meeting and may differentiate between peals rung within ANZAB territory and outside of ANZAB territory.

Peals

80. Rules relating to peals and other performances

- 80.1 No peal shall be recognised as having been rung for the **company** unless at the time of the peal:
 - (a) For peals rung within ANZAB territory:
 - i. At least 50% of the band were members.
 - ii. Non-members may either be **associate members** (if meeting clause 17) or pay a peal fee per performance.
 - (b) For peals rung outside ANZAB territory:
 - i. At least 50% of the band were **members** or **former members**.
 - ii. All ringers must have rung within ANZAB territory.
 - iii. Ringers who were never members may either be **associate members** (if meeting clause 17) or pay a peal fee per performance.
- 80.2 All recognised peals shall be recorded in Ringing Towers and/or by such other means as may be determined at a **general meeting**.
- 80.3 The conductor must:
 - (a) within 3 months of the performance ensure that the details of the peal are submitted to the Peal Secretary or recorded in whatever other way may be determined by the Peal Secretary, and
 - (b) notify the Secretary of any nominations made prior to the performance.
- 80.4 All published ringing performances must conform to any regulations applicable and published from time to time by the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers.

23. Subscriptions: Determination and when payable

- 23.1 The subscriptions payable by **members** and subscriptions and joining fee payable by **associate**members shall be determined from time to time at an annual **general meeting**, and may incorporate such special rates, discounts, or differing arrangements for residents of Australia and New Zealand as may be determined at an annual **general meeting**.
- 3.2 No subscriptions shall be payable by **Honorary Life Members** or by **Honorary Associate Members**.
- 23.3 Subscriptions shall become due and payable on the first day of July each year or on such other date as may be determined at an annual general meeting.
- 23.4 The Secretary may determine a reduced fee for a new member or associate member joining during a subscription year

Peals

80. Rules relating to peals and other performances

- 80.1 No peal shall be recognised as having been rung for the **company** unless at the time of the peal:
 - (a) all members of the band were members or associate members of the company or whose associate membership was backdated in accordance with this constitution to a date not later than the date of the peal, and
 - (b) not fewer than one half of the band were **members** of the **company** or were or were qualified to be **associate members** of the **company** by virtue of clause 17 (c).
- 80.2 All recognised peals shall be recorded in Ringing Towers and/or by such other means as may be determined at a **general meeting**.
- 80.3 The conductor must:
 - (a) within 3 months of the performance ensure that the details of the peal are submitted to the Peal Secretary or recorded in whatever other way may be determined by the Peal Secretary, and
 - (b) notify the Secretary of any nominations made prior to the performance.
- 80.4 All published ringing performances must conform to any regulations applicable and published from time to time by the Central Council of Church Bell Ringers.
